Timeline of Conversion

- The conversion was realized by a group of baristas who had been experiencing labour dispute issues with two previous owners of the café between 2010-2018.
- In the early years of the decade, the baristas ran a successful unionization drive and became members of Service Employees International Union (SEIU) in March 2013.
- The café was then sold to a company called Hebron Hospitality Group in 2016, which renamed the café as Smiling Goat and repeatedly failed to pay the baristas' wages.

- It is at this stage, in 2017, that the baristas began considering conversion to a co-operative as a serious option for taking over the ownership of the café. But the closure of Smiling Goat in April 2018 and the advice and support of their union SEIU and Just Us! Coffee Roasters Co-operative made them finally decide to go ahead with the conversion.
- 90 percent of worker-owners self-identify as queer and operate the café as a "safer space for queer, two-spirit, and trans people in K'jipuktuk (Halifax)".

Key Lessons From Conversion

- Community characteristics played a significant role in this conversion story: The fact
 that the worker-owners of Glitter Bean were a unionized labour group with a decade
 of organizing experience; were highly skilled and experienced in running the café;
 and were a socially cohesive group with a shared LGBTQ+ identity and purpose
 provided them with the necessary expertise and momentum to successfully execute
 the conversion.
- The role of support organizations also cannot be understated: A fellow worker co-operative, Just Us! Coffee Roasters, the original owner of the café before being privatized as Smiling Goat, floated the idea of a conversion into worker co-op when Smiling Goat entered troubled times, and supported the workers in conceptualizing the idea of converting to a worker co-op. At the same time, the baristas' union, the SEIU, provided financial support to make possible the hiring of a co-operative developer, Greg O'Neill, whose financial, legal, and management expertise before and during the conversion was invaluable to the group.
- The fact Glitter Bean was still able to successfully execute the conversion without government support is a testament to the dedication and expertise of the worker-owners and supporting institutions. Glitter Bean's story also serves as a warning that similar groups without access to essential legal, financial, and management services might not end up succeeding in their conversion into a co-operative without adequate governmental support.

Bean's business prospects were hit once again by the Covid-19 pandemic that forced them to temporarily shut their doors in March 2020.

Having partially recovered from their Glitter Bean was able to re-open their precarious financial situation, Glitter doors in June 2020 with strict measures to protect the health of their worker-owners and customers alike. As of November 2020, the café was still operational.
